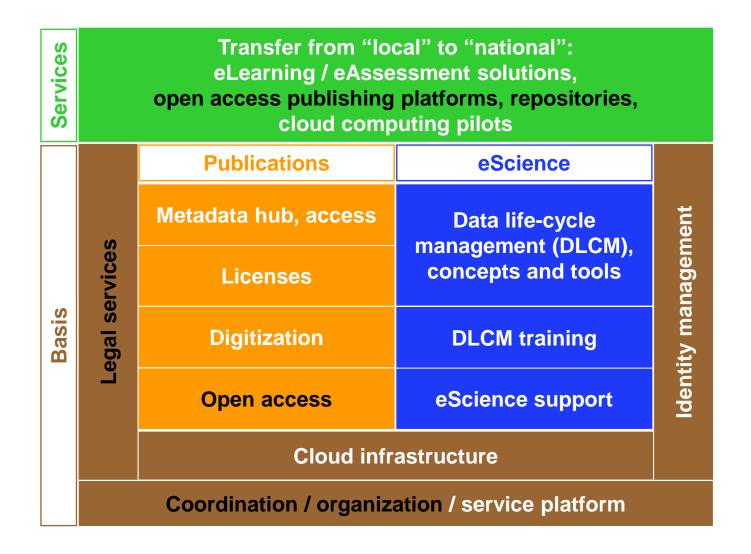

OA in "Scientific Information": added value in National Licences (De Gruyter, Cambridge & Oxford Journal archives)

Copyright: Right is granted to the university to upload the publisher's PDF to the institutional repository.

Coverage: All articles by affiliated authors in the journal archives (several thousand articles for the whole of Switzerland)

- Will publishers provide full texts and metadata for mass imports?
- If yes: How can a university easily import "its" publications in the university's repository?

Offsetting (only De Gruyter): 90% of the APCs paid will be deducted from the total amount of the Consortium's subscription

(avoidance of double dipping was a SUC P-2 requirement)
